

Isaac Prilleltensky

Isaac Prilleltensky is Dean of the School of Education at the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Florida, where he is also a Professor of Educational and Psychological Studies and a Professor of Psychology. Prior to becoming Dean, he was director of the Doctoral Program in Community Research and Action at Peabody College of Vanderbilt University. Isaac was born in Argentina and has studied and worked in Israel, Canada, Australia and the United States. He has lectured widely in South America, Europe, North America, Australia and New Zealand. Isaac is concerned with value-based ways of promoting child, family, and community well-being. He is the author, co-author or co-editor of several books, including *Community Psychology: In Pursuit of Liberation and Well-Being* (with Geoff Nelson, 2005), *Doing Psychology Critically* (with Geoff Nelson, 2002), *Critical Psychology: An Introduction* (with Dennis Fox, 1997), *Promoting Family Wellness and Preventing Child Maltreatment* (with Geoff Nelson and Leslea Peirson 2001), *The Morals and Politics of Psychology* (1994) and he recently published with his wife, Dr. Ora Prilleltensky, *Promoting Well-Being: Linking Personal, Organizational, and Community Change* (Wiley, 2007). Some of his work has been translated into Italian, Indonesian, Greek and Ukrainian. He has been involved in community research and action in various countries and is a Fellow of the American Psychological Association and of the Society for Community Research and Action. In 2002 he was visiting fellow of the British Psychological Society.

Geoffrey Nelson

Geoffrey Nelson is Professor and Chair of Psychology at Wilfrid Laurier University, Waterloo, Ontario. He has served as Senior Editor of the Canadian Journal of Community Mental Health and Chair of the Community Psychology Section of the Canadian Psychological Association. Professor Nelson is a research team member for the Better Beginnings, Better Futures project in Ontario, and he was Co-investigator on the Family Wellness project, a state of the art review of how to promote family wellness and prevent child maltreatment, funded by Human Resources Development Canada. Professor Nelson was the recipient in 1999 of the Harry MacNeill award for innovation in community mental health from the American Psychological Foundation and the Society for Community Research and Action of the American Psychological Association.

Christopher Greeley

Chris Greeley, M.D., respondent for today's teleconference, has been a member of Prevent Child Abuse Tennessee's Board of Directors since 2003 and a member of PCA America's Board of Directors since 2006. Dr. Greeley is an assistant professor of Pediatrics at the Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt. He is also serving on the Children's Justice Task Force, a federally mandated group that meets quarterly in Tennessee and has oversight of basic children's justice issues.

Greeley has also served on the selected committee on child and youth Child Preventive Services (CPS) reform subcommittee and helped to re-write the laws governing how child abuse must be reported, and expanded the law allowing the Department of Children's Services (DCS) to act on requests to approach a "family in need" with aid and access to programs that might prevent child abuse and neglect.
